The program has clearly demonstrated that it has met each of the content areas requested by the Massachusetts Board of Higher Education. Consistent with the mission of the College, the program also has a focus on diversity and offers several courses in that area. There is no question that the program is as rigorous as other programs at Bridgwater. We believe that if the commitment by the College to the program remains strong, this program could be considered one of the College's elite programs. There is evidence that the program will continue to improve as all levels of administration have indicated continued resources and encouragement for the Department. The newly hired faculty and Chair have developed an exciting set of courses that are cohesive, traditional in the core (e.g., Courts and Criminal Law), and responsive to new developments in the field (e.g., Privatization of Criminal Justice see B1, B2, B11). Core courses are prerequisites for electives.
C	1	2	3	4	Full time faculty currently teach approximately 80% of all the criminal justice courses in the Department. This percentage will likely increase with the addition of two faculty members that the Department plans to hire in the Fall of 2006. The full time faculty all have criminal justice degrees from nationally known criminal justice programs. While the full time faculty are relatively new in their careers, the reviewers felt that they were highly committed to teaching, research and service. The reviewers were concerned about the heavy teaching load of the faculty while they try to engage in research, community service and build the Department. Thus, we suggest that at least one of the new hires occur at the associate professor level. There is no current evidence that there is consistent allocation of teaching assistants in the program. This is because all assistantships are handed out at the College level and criminal justice is often left out of the allocation. The College plans changing the way teaching assistants are allocated to more fairly distribute them among the programs in the college. This will benefit the Department of Criminal Justice because teaching assistants aid faculty in their academic responsibilities.
