Continuation of Approval of Criminal Justice Program

The Police Career Incentive Pay Program (PCIPP), also known as the "Quinn Bill," was enacted by the Legislature in 1970 for the purpose of encouraging police officers in participating municipalities to earn degrees in law enforcement and criminal justice and to provide educational incentives through salary increases. The Quinn Bill was amended in June 2002 to give the Board of Higher Education (BHE) authority to, among other things, develop and implement quality guidelines (e.g., program standards and a review process) for programs seeking to participate in the PCIPP, and periodically review programs for compliance with the standards. M.G.L. c. 41, §108L. The Board approved the *Guidelines for Criminal Justice and Law Enforcement Programs* in February 2003 for implementation on January 1, 2004. The *Guidelines* include quality standards and the process to be followed for program review. Institutions must submit annual reports and the programs must undergo a complete review once every five years.

Department staff have thoroughly reviewed materials submitted by Dean College for its Associate in Science in Criminal Justice program and found that the materials demonstrate compliance with all standards found within the *Guidelines for Criminal Justice and Law Enforcement Programs*.

The program will continue on the approved program list for the Police Career Incentive Pay Program for an additional five years, subject to submission of annual reports certifying that the program is being maintained and operated within the provisions and spirit of the *Guidelines*.
