For State University and UMass Students Only

The Student Advisory Council (SAC) is an advisory committee to the Board of Higher Education (BHE) and is comprised of the student trustees and SGA Presidents from the community colleges, state universities and the University of Massachusetts. It is the responsibility of this Council to elect two segmental advisors to the BHE. You do not need to be a student trustee or SGA President to apply for this position.

Role of the Segmental Advisor:

- Represent your segment on the Board of Higher Education, in a non-voting, advisory capacity
- Serve as serve as an ex officio, non-voting member the SAC Executive Committee

For the 2019-2020 academic period, the student segmental advisor members on the Board of Higher Education will be representatives from the State University and UMass segments. Applicants for the Student Segmental Advisor Member of the Board of Higher Education must submit the following information:

1. Résumé

2. Statement of Purpose

This brief essay should summarize your interest in serving on the Board of Higher Education and demonstrate your understanding of this leadership role.

Segmental Advisor Interview Sample Questions

- 1. In your opinion, what are the three most important issues facing higher education for next year? Please prioritize these issues.
- 2. What do you see as the role of the student member of the Board of Higher Education?
- 3. How familiar are you with parliamentary procedures?
- 4. Can you outline the state budget process for public higher education?
- 5. Why do you want this position?
- 6. Are you aware of the time commitment for this position? Are you willing to accept the rigors of the job given the impact on your academic studies?
- 7. What mode of communication will you use to inform students and receive feedback from students about issues influencing public higher education in Massachusetts?
