Thank you for the opportunity to review and reply to President Birge's response to Berkshire Community College's (BCC) letter related to MCLA's proposal to develop a Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. While my preference would be to have a face-to-face conversation, I offer some factual corrections and context related to the MCLA letter dated January 12, 2023.

BCC's primary concern with a BSN program in Berkshire County is based on resources. Nursing faculty are in short supply, especially as health care facilities focus on retention of existing nurses. Nursing programs have strict guidelines to meet to remain in compliance with MABORN and national accreditors. Clinical sites and placements are capped, and the resources to support nursing programs are extensive and not easily acquired after the initial startup.

Based on what I share below, I ask that the DHE consider postponing a decision on this program to allow a careful review of the impact of this program on our community and on both institutions.

The initial conversations regarding this proposed program took place in 2017. Although President Birge noted that BCC was "at the table" and had "been aware" of program developments, neither I nor anyone else from BCC has spoken with MCLA about this program since that time. President Birge and I were jointly invited to attend a meeting at Berkshire Health Systems on May 8, 2017, with the express title on all our calendars of "...to discuss nursing education."

Shortly after that meeting, I invited President Birge and members of his team to visit our campus to discuss ways in which we could collaborate. We met on July 19th, 2017. As stated in my earlier letter, we shared all our materials (copied at the end of this letter) from enrollment and persistence to NCLEX pass rates. The attached document illustrates the ideas we presented to MCLA reflecting various forms of collaboration. We began with BCC providing the first three years of nursing education and MCLA providing the fourth year (and thus not replicating nursing labs, faculty etc.) and included additional ways, such as BCC providing core nursing courses (30 credits) on the MCLA campus or on the BCC campus as a unique cohort. In our discussion we demonstrated that a partnership maximizing credit taking at BCC would save students \$10,000 (in 2017) on the cost of a BSN degree and would allow students to take the

NCLEX a year earlier and begin a nursing career while they completed the final year of the BSN at MCLA. Students would earn an Associate Degree in Nursing en route to a Bachelor's Degree in Science Nursing. We gave President Birge and his team a tour of our recently renovated facilities.

President Birge stated they would review the materials and would be in touch. Six weeks later, I contacted President Birge. President Birge informed me that they were pursuing their own degree and I should work with Westfield State on a degree completion program. I was surprised by this and asked if I could meet with him to discuss. A meeting was set up at MCLA on September 6th, 2017; I met with President Birge, Denise Richardello, Executive Vice President, and Gina Puc, Dean of Enrollment. I respectfully asked them to reconsider their approach expressing my concern that their pursuit could leave both institutions weakened or even failing. We would be cannibalizing each other for faculty, clinical sites, students, resources, etc., and could instead provide many options if we worked together. I shared that our partnership would be unique and whether maximizing credit taking at BCC or spreading the enrollment (and minimizing the infrastructure cost), it would be an intriguing national model of partnership. The final MCLA comment in this discussion was that their students and their families wouldn't understand partnering with a community college. At no point did MCLA present any model for collaboration with BCC or even suggest pathways for BCC students.

President Birge says that the MCLA proposed program was developed with BCC's RN's in mind with strong pathways for transfer. There were no conversations with BCC since September 6th, 2017, related to this program. In that time, BCC has added a second cohort (January entry) and has expanded its transfer pathways to many BSN degree granting institutions, both one year and two-year programs. As stated in my letter dated December 11, 2022, BCC has strong partnerships with Westfield, UMass Amherst, Elms, SNHU, and URI.

President Birge says that MCLA's program will be grounded in the liberal arts leading to a "professional, not technical, nursing degree..." BCC's ADN program, similar to all associate degree level programs, encompasses science, arts and humanities, and foundations of the profession as required by MABORN. The ADN program has 10 end-of-program student learning outcomes (EPSLOs) that are the basis for everything that we do in the program. The 10 EPSLOs are derived from the Massachusetts Nurse of the Future Nursing Core Competencies and include Patient-Centered Care, Professionalism, Leadership, Systems-Based Practice, Informatics and Technology, Communication, Teamwork and Collaboration, Safety, Quality Improvement, and Evidence-Based Practice. To say that BCC's ADN is only a technical nursing degree is inaccurate and unfair. It should also be noted that the ADN and BSN graduates take the same NCLEX exam; each successful ADN and BSN graduate becomes a registered nurse (RN).

President Birge uses national demographic statistics for community college ADN students (37-44 years old), extrapolates "an approximate 20-year nursing career trajectory" for them and goes on to note that MCLA students will enter at 18 and have a fifty-year career versus a forty-

year career for ADN's. The five-year median age of BCC's nursing students is 27, not 37 to 44. Assuming that the MCLA student graduates at 22, the difference in career length from a BCC graduate would be six or seven years not 30.

President Birge notes that recent BCC ADN students have continued their educations out-of-state. In the last five years, 90 students transferred to BSN programs. The top enrollers were Southern New Hampshire University (40), UMass Amherst (13) and Our Lady of the Elms (10). Online BSN completion programs have been most appealing as they allow students to work while completing the BSN.

President Birge asserts there will be more than enough clinical placements for nursing programs in Berkshire County. Currently, BCC uses every unit at Berkshire Medical Center on days and many of the units on evenings for clinical placements Tuesdays through Fridays for nursing students. In addition, we currently have eight clinical groups in skilled nursing facilities this semester in Monday/Tuesday or Thursday/Friday clinicals. Placement on specialty units such as psychiatric and maternity units are very limited for our current cohorts. BCC moved its Practical Nursing students out of acute care in the spring because there are not units for them to be placed on with the additional BCC spring ADN cohort. BCC shares the clinical sites in the Berkshires with Elms, UMass Amherst, Mildred Elley and McCann Technical High School.

President Birge states that BCC graduated 26 employable ADN nurses in 2021. These are the numbers graduating (and intending to graduate) from BCC ADN program in a five-year span:

- 2019 37
- 2020 57
- 2021 40
- 2022 73
- 2023 82 (anticipating 52 this spring, and 30 in the fall)

In his letter, it appears President Birge chose a number from a pandemic year and equates only those who passed the NCLEX on their first try as "employable individuals." What is left out of this assessment is that 89% of the students who took the NCLEX the second time passed the exam. This cohort, made up of licensed practical nurses, worked as licensed practical nurses through their studies and immediately following the completion of the ADN program, leaving them little or no time to prepare for the NCLEX.

Note that in January 2021, BCC welcomed its first spring cohort of ADN students with the first graduates of this program having completed the program in December 2022.

Between 2023 and 2028, BCC projects ADN graduates of between 400-500 individuals. The College's most recent ADN NCLEX *first time test taking* pass rate was 82%.

President Birge states that MCLA's work to develop RN to BSN couldn't happen before securing approval from MABORN and added "which directly addresses BCC's initial concerns regarding additional pathways for their students." The needs of our students are being met with the RN to BSN partnerships in place. UMass Amherst is applying for a grant to support no cost/low cost advancement in nursing degrees and BCC provided a letter of support.

Nationwide, and certainly statewide, there is a critical shortage of nurses working in *nursing education*, this will only be more problematic with MABORN's new regulations that prohibit the hiring of a BSN level nurse to provide clinical instruction as they have for many years. There are a limited number of Master's-prepared nurses available in the Berkshires or willing to relocate to the Berkshires to meet the needs for nursing education.

BCC has not been part of MCLA's plan for this program and was not invited to participate in its strategic plan where this may have been discussed. Again, I ask the DHE to consider postponing a decision on this program to allow a careful review of the impact of this program on our community and on both institutions.

Perhaps I can add a little clarification:

Since MCLA wants/plans to develop their own traditional four year BSN program, we are proposing (Approach #1) another option for them to consider.: their own cohort of RN/BS in nursing students. This approach has many advantages: MCLA attracts non-local students, gets residency students to take all non- nursing courses at their campus, utilizing BCC's establised ADN NUR courses (achieve A.S. in nursing) without the financial/labor investment for MCLA to duplicate SIM lab equipment, faculty etc. BCC gets a MCLA cohort of nursing students along with their own cohort. MCLA gets BCC transfer students into their senior year RN/BS component along with their cohort. So the choice for them is really between the traditional pathway and the RN/BS in nursing pathway. We feel Approach #1 is a win-win for BCC and MCLA.

We include Approach #2 in our presentation to show the current BCC/MCLA pathway. Data included in separate attachment shows last five year outcomes of this collaboration: 55% graduates from BCC/UMA pathway.

Another one of the 35 (Georgetown University) was an A.S to M.S.N. transfer. In addition to these 35 transfers, other data, not shown here, indicated 15 BCC transfers to other community colleges in Massachusetts before transferring to UMA. My research showed these transfers (not really transfers) occurred for the purpose of completion of pre requisites based upon my advisement, when courses were not offered at BCC, not online, or not at desired times. The students from this group went on to UMA and are counted in the UMA data.
